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Historic Times and Good Vides

n the land of Fairfield, Iowa, the vibes have always been positive. After all, from the moment settler Nancy Bonnifield laid eyes on the expanse that would become our city, she knew such fair fields were deserving of a name to suit them. As the years went on, Fairfield became a hub of good vibes for the State of Iowa - we hosted the first two Iowa State Fairs in 1854-55, opening with the presentation of a 360-pound "Great Denmark Cheese." Our early history is on display to this day through the many historic sites around town. The Carnegie Museum, for example, is housed in Fairfield's original Carnegie Library, the first such library west of the Mississippi. Early settler architecture is on display with the Bonnifield Cabin at Bonnifield Park, the oldest two-story log house in lowa, and the McElhinney House, a stunning New England-style manor built in 1846.

Visitors can also peer back in time through sites such as the Elm Grove School House, one of 400 remaining one-room schools in lowa, and Maasdam Barns, which bred and raised award-winning draft horses from 1910-1938 and pioneered agricultural machinery with its use of the Louden monorail system. We've always valued higher education here, serving as home to Parsons College for nearly a century. Today, Maharishi International University carries on that tradition to provide knowledge to all who seek it, as well as shaping Fairfield into a hub for arts and culture in the Midwest. The establishment of MIU in Fairfield enhanced the cultural trajectory of the city, drawing in talent from all over the globe and transforming Fairfield into a center for the arts in Southeast Iowa.

Fairfield becomes the first city in lowa to offer library services. The Fairfield library eventually becomes the first Carnegie Library west of the Mississippi River in 1893. 1839 Fairfield is settled. Named by settler Nancy Bonnifield, it becomes the county seat the same year.

THE CARNEGIE MUSEUM:

Telling The Fairfield Story







ometimes to learn about your hometown, you have to do a little digging. Depending on where you come from, that task can be easier said than done. Fairfield isn't one of those places. For years, the Carnegie Museum been a regular part of the community, telling the fascinating stories of Fairfield and the people who built and shaped it into the city it is today. Housed in what was originally Fairfield's Carnegie Library, the museum tells the harrowing stories of local heroes like Maj. Mehitable E. Woods, a Civil War hero who cared for Union soldiers in lowa and ran supplies to troops all along the Mississippi River, reaching as far south as Louisiana. But the curios that fill the Carnegie Museum go far beyond those you'd be accustomed to finding in any small-town museum. Sure, fossils found locally and memorabilia from the old Parsons College fill the halls, but the collection becomes much more eclectic as you wander from display to display.

"We have a lot of Native American pottery that dates back to the early years. We have Civil War and Lincoln artifacts on display along with a really cool collection of World War II posters. We have pioneer tools and we have firearms. For such a small museum, we have just a wealth of antiquities and collections."



ART IN FAIRFIELD, IOWA:

A Not So Hidden Gem

e honest — you probably wouldn't imagine a cultural, artistic hub could take root outside a major metropolitan city, much less Southeast Iowa. But as the old saying goes, there's inspiration everywhere. When artists flock to Fairfield, they don't just see another small town, Instead, they see a town bustling with opportunity and inspiration.

For more than 50 years, various initiatives have been instrument

initiatives have been instrumental in the growth of Fairfield's art scene. The Fairfield Art Association, founded in 1966, began offering classes and workshops to local artists of all ages based in the old Carnegie Library building. Since 2007, the association has been headquartered in the Fairfield Arts & Convention Center. In 2002, Stacey Hurlin founded the First Fridays Art Walk, attracting thousands to revel in the local art and music of Fairfield. Additionally, galleries such as Art 52 and ICON Gallery serve to boost the visibility of artists in Fairfield and provide them with a creative outlet.

That need for a creative outlet is why Bill Teeple himself founded ICON Gallery 20 years ago. At that time, he had been teaching art in one of the buildings downtown and rented some of the empty rooms to hang art in. Eventually, artists gathered on the third floor for makeshift openings and the gallery grew beyond its humble origins, necessitating a move to its current location at 58 N. Main St. in 2007. The ICON Gallery has since become a creative nucleus for the artistic community, longing for the art scenes of larger cities.

"ALL THESE PEOPLE WOULD COME HERE, AND THEY WERE MISSING THE CULTURE OF THE BIG CITY AND THE CULTURE OF THE EAST COAST AND WEST COAST," Teeple said.

"So, when I opened the gallery and these music venues started happening, everyone felt this relief that the things they'd been missing were now starting to happen in Fairfield. Now, it's been going on in Fairfield so long that people are moving here just to be part of the art scene."



Teeple himself came to Fairfield from Los Angeles, but he's not the only one who made the pilgrimage to Southeast Iowa. Barry Ross — a professional illustrator whose work has appeared in Sports Illustrated, Golf Magazine, and Flying Magazine and has been featured at the Museum of Flight in Seattle, the Wings Over the Rockies Air & Space Museum, and the EAA Aviation Museum — took up permanent

residence in Fairfield after discovering Transcendental Meditation in 1974. Other nationally recognized artists like John Preston (above) — creator of breathtaking Midwest landscapes featured by Iowa State University, John Deere, and the Chicago Federal Reserve — and David Kupferman — whose art has been shown from San Francisco to Miami and been spotlighted by J.P. Morgan Bank and Fidelity Investments — came to Fairfield from the East Coast to find a thriving, exciting art community.




"THERE IS SUCH A PARTICIPATION ON THE PART OF THE OTHER TOWNSPEOPLE IN FAIRFIELD, SO WHEN YOU HAVE A SHOW OR PUT SOMETHING ONLINE, YOU GET ALL THESE WONDERFUL, LOVING REACTIONS," Ross said.

"In New York, you go to an opening and everyone's looking around saying, Who's that? And who's that? Can they help me?' Everything is about making money and making sales. Out here, it was all about the art — it was all about how beautiful it was. Life just settled down into a sweet, everyday experience... I don't have the same stresses that I had in New York City. I still love being here. It's still exciting. I couldn't possibly have the studio that I have in Fairfield in New York." Thanks to galleries like ICON and Art 52 — and the innumerable contributions from artists who have made temporary or permanent homes here — Fairfield's art scene has grown wildly to establish the city as a Midwestern creative hub.

"Today, we must have 300 or 400 artists here," Teeple said. "And there are a ton of musicians with three or four significant musical venues. We even offer live poetry reading. Fairfield has become an art center... [It] has a certain flavor that sort of seeps into your bloodstream once you get here. There's a lot going on here in little nooks and crannies that people can discover."





ILLUMINATING ARTWORK

Radim Schreiber has always been fascinated with fireflies. The insects are rare in his native Czech Republic, so they were a captivating sight when he first came to Fairfield in 1998. That image stuck with Schreiber for several years, during which time he patiently waited for camera technology and lighting to catch up to his idea. Finally, with a high-speed lens and full-frame DSLR, he managed to snap a couple photos in his garden and was instantly blown away. "I got so excited that the following year, I spent the whole summer photographing fireflies," Schreiber said. One of those photographs, "Amber Firefly," ended up earning Schreiber high praise, winning the 8th Annual Smithsonian Magazine Photo Contest in 2010.

"I'M TRYING TO CONVEY MY EXPERIENCE... VERY SOOTHING, VERY PEACEFUL — ALMOST SPIRITUAL,"

Schreiber said, adding that because he shoots at night, there are much fewer distractions. "It's very beautiful and a great connection with nature. That is what I want to convey. So, when I create videos, the music that I add is to support the kind of experience that I want to share." That ability to build a connection and share an experience with people is one of the biggest reasons Schreiber continues to shoot. "I can connect with people and bring joy to their hearts," Schreiber said. "They share with me not only how much they like my work but how much they like fireflies and nature. That is a fulfilling feeling — somebody connects with me and the same level of joy, and I can trigger that level of joy and those feelings that they remember from their childhood."

The Arts & Convention Center, home to the Sondheim Center for the Performing Arts, has become a cultural focal point for Fairfield, hosting nationally recognized shows such as *Chicago* and *Rent*. The Arts & Convention Center maintains a rotation of nationally recognized plays, concerts, and shows from September through May.

"We try to host something that's unique for this part of Iowa — and the region as well," Bauer said. "When I program, I try to choose things that are excellent, saying something that needs to be said right now, right here by the people that I know, but also things that are surprising. I love to share something that we haven't seen here before." The creativity in the performing arts you find at the Arts & Convention Center radiates throughout the entire town. At night, live music fills the air as local shops transform into mini concert venues.

Take Café Paradiso, for example. There, you'll see a daytime coffee shop transform into a venue for folk, indie rock, jazz, and more. You can also catch the Fairfield nightlife vibe at the Depot House, whose robust calendar of events, diverse performers, and

great food makes it one of Fairfield's premier destinations.

The Cider City




hat does it take to bring a world-class cidery to the city you grew up in? If you ask Clint Stephenson, a lot of ambition, creativity, and washing machines.

Stephenson — one of four friends along with Hopi James, Annalisa Thompson, and Cole Fishback, who co-founded Fishback & Stephenson Cider House — helped take what started as a hobby between friends in the basement of one of their homes to one of the premier cideries in lowa.

"WE STARTED WALKING AROUND THE COUNTY PICKING APPLES AND COMING UP WITH CREATIVE WAYS TO MAKE CIDER," Stephenson said,

adding residents around town were eager to have the group come and pick apples that had fallen from their trees and were attracting insects. "We started putting ads in newspapers, Craigslist, and Facebook to go pick people's apples." The operation has grown quite a bit since its genesis in 2014. Fishback & Stephenson processes anywhere from 16,000–20,000 pounds of apples in a week with distribution in lowa, Illinois, and Missouri. The cidery also boasts a large belt press along with several heating and cooling tanks. And now, Fishback & Stephenson will begin canning its own cider in-house.



And the result? Fishback & Stephenson was named the 2020 lowa Cider Producer of the Year by the New York International Cider Competition. The cider house even hosted a pop-up Mooby's restaurant based on the fictional restaurant chain in director Kevin Smith's films, producing a limited-edition cider called Jay & Silent Bob Cherry Kush to coincide with the event. "It's things like that with Fairfield. There's that creativity," Stephenson said. "There's usually some sort of connection from the art department from (Maharishi International University) or the film school, or someone meets somebody or gets here from around the globe or the coasts."









CIDER WORKS

In 2013, Fairfield natives Jesse Narducci and Katie Greenfield began making cider sourced from locally grown apples. That dream lives on today through Jefferson County Ciderworks, a cidery located just west of Fairfield on 200th Street. Hand-crafted and rooted in American cider-making traditions, each batch of apples is pressed on site to guarantee a one-of-a-kind flavor with every sip with no artificial flavors or additional sugars. With a wide variety of flavors — from core ciders like Original Apple and Sour Cherry to seasonals such as Cranberry Orange and Winter Botanical — you're sure to find a taste that suits you in the cidery's onsite restaurant and taproom. Wine & Dine

CEDAR VALLEY WINERY

Who says you need to go all the way out to California for a good wine? Just west of town of Route 34, Cedar Valley Winery features an array of wines made right here in Fairfield using grapes grown by the Miller family. Utilizing an eight-acre vineyard with seven grape varieties grown onsite, Cedar Valley produces about 2,500 gallons of award-



winning red and white wine annually. Whether you're looking for something rich and full-bodied or sweet and light, find the flavor you're looking for in the winery's tasting room. Or if you prefer a little fresh air with your wine, enjoy breathtaking vistas from the winery's deck overlooking the vineyard.

SOMM WINES

Feel like just grabbing a glass and kicking back? SOMM Wines (102 E. Briggs Ave.) offers by-the-glass wine service in its lounge along with an incredible array of wines from around the world. Owner Krista Matthes brings nearly two decades of experience as a sommelier to SOMM Wines, where she has hand-selected more than 200 bottles from every major wine region on the planet. Enjoy a glass — as well as their "Best in the Midwest" cheese and charcuterie board — and relax in their lounge or take a bottle home with you from their retail store.

VERAISON WINE BAR

For a sample of European flavor, Veraison (508 N. 2nd St.) offers a menu of wines hand-selected by owner and world traveler Julia Punj. With a menu featuring 120 wines from all over Europe, you'll have no trouble finding a taste to suit you. Order by the glass or by the bottle, then head outside and enjoy Veraison's gorgeous, European-inspired patio. And of course, be sure to pair your wine with some tapas!



OUTDOORS & BIKING:

In The Loop

he highlight of our outdoor recreation, the Loop Trail, a 16-mile paved path encircling the city, is an ideal destination whether you prefer to get around by foot or by two wheels. Built in 2009 when the state added a four-lane bypass for U.S. Route 34, the Loop Trail serves as a connector between Fairfield and other outdoor areas around Jefferson County.

"Biking is huge in lowa — that's undeniable," says Mark Smith, owner of Fairfield's local bike shop, The Ride. After all, with its smaller communities and wide-open spaces, the entire state —

not just Fairfield — is perfect for biking. Road riders will even find a relatively safe environment as opposed to areas with more traffic. "Southeast lowa has a certain charm. It's hilly and there are more woods than usual," Smith said.

- MAASDAM BARNS Historic Maasdam Barns and Museum offers a snapshot of an early 20th-century draft horse farm and agricultural innovation where J.G. Maasdam raised and sold award-winning draft horses and was at one time home to Louis D'Or, the largest horse in the world.
- LAMSON WOODS STATE PRESERVE & NEFF WETLANDS -Lamson Woods State Preserve and Neff Wetland Area feature 43-acres of woodland and more than 100 species of birds, making it a must-visit destination for any birdwatcher. Originally Fairfield's first golf course, groomed trails and bridges make this area perfectly suited for outdoor enthusiasts.
- **3** CHAUTAUQUA PARK One of Fairfield's most popular parks, Chautaugua Park offers recreational opportunities for all ages, including a playground, grills and shelters for special events, and a disc golf course. Be sure to drop in on the park's community orchard, where residents tend to and grow organic fruits and vegetables for all to enjoy.
- WALTON, PLEASANT, & BONNIFIELD LAKES The Lakes Segment of the Loop Trail takes you to Walton, Pleasant, and Bonnifield Lakes, all retired reservoirs now used for recreational purposes. Take in the scenery of these beautiful waterways from the shore, paddle your way around by canoe or kayak, or cast a line on all three for a chance to reel in bass, bluegill, catfish, crappie, sunfish, and more. Looking for relief on a hot summer day? Bonnifield Lake is also home to Waterworks Park — which features a small sand beach for swimmers as well as a playground, boat launch, and shelters and grills for get-togethers - and Bonnifield Cabin, the oldest two-story log house in Iowa, built by Rhodham Bonnifield and sons in 1838.

- 5 MATKIN PLAZA The beautifully designed Matkin Plaza serves as a perfect blend of Fairfield's artistic and outdoor heritage. Honoring engineer Bill Matkin, who designed the nearby bowstring truss bridge that spans over Route 1, Matkin Plaza features beautifully sculpted concrete benches by artist Judy Bales, plus natural, ornamental grasses and wildflowers that provide a serene stop for riders and hikers to rest.
- 6 HERITAGE PARK Heritage Park features a dedicated pickleball court for all skill levels, from beginners to experts. Play a round of pickup basketball, get a friendly game of softball or kickball in, or kick back and let the little ones explore the playground.
- WHITHAM WOODS Originally the site of the C.W. Whitham Nursery, Whitham Woods features an incredibly diverse population of plant life with more than 100 species of trees in the park. Along with a four-acre prairie plot and a one-acre pond, Whitham Woods offers outdoor opportunities for all seasons, from cross-country skiing in the winter to fishing in the summer.
- THE CEDAR VIEW TRAIL Cedar View Trail is connected. to the Fairfield Loop Trail and also connects to the seven miles of trail within Jefferson County Park. The first segment of Cedar View Trail follows the old railroad right-of-way for approximately one mile to the Cedar View Trail Bridge, where you can have an amazing view of the Cedar Creek Timber & Wetlands.
- JEFFERSON COUNTY PARK Reconnect with the great outdoors at Jefferson County Park. Located on the southwest corner of Fairfield, Jefferson County Park is home to 24 campsites with 20-, 30-, and 50-amp electric hookups, as well as two cabins available for rental — an ideal spot for campers from May to October. While you're there, check out the park's seven miles of trails through timber, prairie, and wetlands. Feeling brave? Head across the park's 75-foot swinging bridge - just don't look down!





A Lifetime Of Good Vibes

hat lures people to live in our small, Southeast lowa city? How about a lifetime of good vibes? How about a small-town city with big city amenities? How about a calm, peaceful, multicultural city where everyone knows everyone and the people you see on the street always wave back? You see, the people who come to Fairfield don't just make it a stepping-stone to something bigger and better. They make it home. In many cases, residents arrive through the Maharishi International University, and after spending years in our community, discover they don't want to leave.

"I CAME HERE TO GO TO MIU. INITIALLY I THOUGHT I WOULD MOVE BACK HOME TO THE EAST COAST. BUT AFTER GRADUATING, I JUST FELL IN LOVE WITH THIS LITTLE TOWN," - said Sankari Wegman, a local Ayurvedic

Consultant who came for an education and stayed for the love of the city.

"It just feels so quiet and simple. I just ended up staying here. It's been years since I graduated, but I just love living here. I feel like I've made so many dear family friends.

"It's just a very lovely place to live. After I got married and had kids, it just felt like a very, very sweet place to raise our children."

"I did notice a really big contrast from where we used to live. We were definitely lacking a sense of community. The D.C. metro area is very transient," said Fairfield resident Jessica Hatchette. "That's not to say a lot of new people don't live in Fairfield, but I find that there's a different vibe here. As soon as we moved here, people just wanted to know who we were and talked to us — so open, so friendly. It made it easy to feel comfortable right away."

Once here, you'll find the same quality of life you'd find in any larger city — but scaled down in a safe, welcoming community. "There are plenty of activities for the kids and family to do all year-round. I went and visited my brother in a larger city, and the things that we did in the larger city were the same things that we do here in Fairfield," said Fairfield City Engineer Melanie Carlson. "We went to a museum; we have the Carnegie Museum right here in Fairfield. Then we went to a playground, which we have lots of playgrounds in Fairfield. And then we went out for dinner and the variety in that larger town was probably less than the variety we have in Fairfield."













The only difference is the pace at which life moves. Because when you're not spending half your life stuck in traffic, you find much more time to devote to your hobbies and passions.

"When you're trying to raise three kids in a city and it takes you 45 minutes to get to a grocery store in traffic, a lot of your life is just sucked up with commuting and that carries through the rest of your life," said Jessica Hatchette. "You just have so much less time for simple pleasures. Living in Fairfield allows us to have time to be together as a family and really bond and nurture that family structure."

The same goes for children, who find the same activities and extra-curriculars they'd find in any city. Fairfield is home to several youth sports and programs through Fairfield Parks and Recreation. "We came to Fairfield originally in June 2018. There were a number of reasons, but the biggest was probably we have three small kids and we really wanted to give them something different. The energy was not right in the D.C. area. We wanted the opposite of D.C. — less traffic, less angry, more homey, more community feel. And Fairfield filled those boxes," said Fairfield resident Greg Hatchette.



4 Must-Do Activities













MAHARISHI VEDIC OBSERVATORY

A truly one-of-a-kind installation reminiscent of ancient observatories such as Maachu Picchu and Stonehenge, the Maharishi Vedic Observatory, located just north of Fairfield, is a 1.5-acre, open-air observatory consisting of gorgeously sculpted concrete and marble astronomical instruments and sundials to show in one compact form the movement of the sun, planets, and stars.



BONNIFIELD CABIN

Located adjacent to Waterworks Park, Bonnifield Cabin stands as the oldest two-story log house in the state of lowa, a testament to the hard work of the settlers who first arrived in Fairfield in the 1830s. This historic site offers a snapshot of early pioneer life and is believed to be the site where the city of Fairfield was officially named.



JEFFERSON COUNTY WATER TRAILS

Paddle your way through Jefferson County on the beautiful water trails in the eastern and southern parts of the county. The Skunk River Trail includes a 10.5-mile stretch through eastern Jefferson County, while the Cedar Creek Water Trail includes a scenic, 6-mile section in southern Jefferson County, a perfect opportunity for canoers and kayakers.



CARNEGIE MUSEUM

Explore the rich, eclectic history of Fairfield in the original Carnegie
Library building downtown. Discover fascinating curios from around the world and learn more about the local history through exhibits honoring local heroes such as Maj. Mehitable E. Woods.



Come on in — the water's fine!

Available for family gatherings and a quick dip in the hot summer sun. Bring your fishing pole or kayak and enjoy a day on the lake.

BIRD WATCHING

Fairfield is a birder's paradise with many outdoor spots around town serving as perfect opportunities to spot the many species that call Fairfield home — or the ones that make Fairfield a stopping point on their long migration. Check out the many parks and conservation areas around Fairfield and be sure to bring a pair of binoculars.



JOHNNY CLOCK MUSEUM

Located in nearby Lockridge, the Johnny Clock Museum features a spectacular collection of hand-crafted, wood clocks designed and hand-carved by curator John McClain.



VINTAGE POWER WAGON ANNUAL RALLY

Rev up your engines — you gearheads won't want to miss the Vintage Power Wagon Annual Rally every June in downtown Fairfield. See these gorgeous, vintage Dodge trucks in action during the Grand Power Wagon Parade and get an up-close look during the open-air truck show on the square.


JEFFERSON COUNTY PARK




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
